




Feodum/feudum (n.)

- Fief or fee
 - What does that mean in English?
 - Property given in exchange for oaths of loyalty and service (often by not always military service)
 - Property over which someone held authority








"The basic government and society in Europe during the Middle Ages was based around the feudal system"

Feudal Pyramid of Power



Ties of Loyalty/Obligation: Lordship

LORD

- needs armed knights
- Grants land to men who become vassals




Provides government
Provides justice
Provides other infrastructure

VASSALS

- Promise military service
- Support household from land and use assets to provide military support to lord

PEASANTS

- Need protection from raids
- Promise to work land for lord/vassal
